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Newcastle Coal Infrastructure Group wins 'Hunter Water Love Water' Award

One of the region's largest volume water users that connects coal mines of the Hunter Valley, Gunnedah, Gloucester and the Western Coalfields of New South Wales to the world has taken out the 'Hunter Water Love Water' award at this year's annual Hunter Business awards.

Newcastle Coal Infrastructure Group (NCIG) is the 2023 winner, recognised for reducing water consumption significantly across its Kooragang Island site after undertaking a Water Efficiency Management Plan (WEMP).

Crowning the win is NCIG's Recycled Water Project, which saves 275 million litres of drinking water each year or the annual water usage of just over 1700 residential homes.

Further contributing to NCIG's win are several other measures the coal export terminal has identified through its WEMP including:

- significant investigation into leakage
- · water sub-metering and flow monitoring
- reduced irrigation
- capturing and re-using stormwater.

Hunter Water knows working closely with businesses helps conserve our precious drinking water supply and can help businesses financially in the long term.

Along with NCIG, Ingenia Holiday Parks and The Wests Group were recognised for their water conservation efforts by being named as finalists at this year's awards.

Water efficiency experts at Hunter Water review and select the winner from among the shortlisted businesses.

Hunter Water Managing Director, Darren Cleary, congratulated all three finalists for their work in conserving our most precious resource.

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"Our WEMP provided an invaluable insight into the opportunities to drought-proof our operations and significantly reduce reliance on the region's drinking water. The Recycled Water Project was one of the recommendations from our WEMP and, since commencing operations in April, has already contributed to the reduction of our use of drinking water," Mr Johansen said.

The 'Hunter Water Love Water' award, a Hunter Water and Business Hunter initiative, is judged on innovation, appeal for widespread adoption, water savings, and the payback period.

To enter the award, organisations are required to adopt a WEMP and introduce water-saving initiatives into their business.
